Helen Porter Mitchell adopted the professional name Melba acknowledge her birthplace, Melbourne. She began to study singing seriously in 1882 and made her operatic début in Brussels in 1887. Melba won acclaim at Covent Garden and the Metropolitan Opera and subsequently in most of the leading opera houses of the world until her retirement, becoming the epitome of glamour and fame. Melba's voice was remarkable for its even quality over a range of nearly three octaves, and for its pure silvery timbre. Her first recordings were made in 1904 for The Gramophone and Typewriter Company, the precursor of HMV. The repertoire is drawn from Melba's operatic rôles in La Bohème and Faust, as well as from the popular and traditional ballads and songs of the period, such as those by Tosti, and Bemberg, who can be heard accompanying Melba in works composed by himself.
